Emmeline Hardy finally left home on the night James Henyard died. The news of his death was common knowledge in the village within an hour of Mr. Bracken finding the body. Emmeline said nothing to anyone, but as soon as possible she slipped upstairs, packed a small case containing necessities and pulling on an old raincoat she passed out unobserved by the back way. It was a long walk up the hill to the station but Emmeline knew every stick and stone of the way. It was getting dark now, and as she passed the corner she saw a light in a window of the schoolhouse and guessed that Dr Barley was still there. She had little hope of leaving the village unobserved, but trusted to luck she would not meet the one person she wanted to avoid, Francis Bracken. It might, she thought, have been safer to go by way of the fields and the church, but the distance was considerably more and there would be the added risk of losing the train. However, it was not very likely that Francis would take an evening walk up Station Hill which was unusually steep and rough underfoot, and Emmeline went on fairly confidently. She had not covered more than half the way when she became aware that she was being followed. At first she paid no attention to the footsteps behind her. believing them to be those of some homing villager who would presently turn into one of the nearby cottages. At length, when a small stone crept into her shoe and she was obliged to stop in order to shake it out, she was vaguely alarmed to find that the footsteps stopped also and did not recommence until she had once more started on her way. Puzzled she halted again, pretending to adjust the bag she carried, and once more the footsteps stopped and started in time with her own. Now she was sure.

It is an ugly sensation to feel one is being followed, and it requires courage to look over one's shoulder at who knows what behind. Nevertheless, after a few moments of uneasiness during which the footsteps tapped behind her with monotonous regularity, Emmeline managed to turn her head in the direction of the sound.

There was no one visible, nothing but the bare downward stretch of the hill with the shadows of the trees and cottages merging into one another as the darkness deepened. She stood still for a moment peering this way and that but could distinguish no one. Tales of young women attacked on lonely country roads sprang uneasily to her mind. With difficulty she pulled herself together and began to walk more quickly. Immediately her pursuer hastened after her. Ahead she could make out the dim outline of the station. She did her best to keep her legs under control but by the time she reached the station yard she was practically at a run.
