Who Are My People?

- As a result of my world tour and of my lengthy struggle with such issues as justice, equality, prejudice, tolerance and culture, I have come to a new sense of my own identity as a European person. I have realised that I have deep connections with the earth through my own cultural ancestry. It has become a great source of my own self-worth. I have learned that there is no need to look to other cultures for our own identity. Any of us who choose to look more deeply into our European roots will find there, rich and diverse experience waiting to be discovered. I have been deeply drawn to the projection of our hands on caves, stone walls, bones or canvases, bronze or gold and on paper. In the **desire** to express ourselves and find meaning in life, I have become aware of the universality of all human experience. At the same

time, I have become aware of a complex, painful, yet rich history of **connections** to all other peoples. I have realised that white communities can be drawn together with people everywhere who are struggling with questions of cultural and human survival.

15 We can now develop a deep commitment to the preservation and strengthening of diversity at home and throughout the world. We can become aware that our energy and vision, along with those of other Europeans of all cultures, are essential to the healing that must take place if we are to survive as pluralistic and just nation-states. It is time for a redefinition of multicultural Europe. As the demands of new social, economic, political and cultural challenges increase, our commitment to the
20 future must change. It is neither **appropriate** nor desirable for any nation to be in a position of unnecessary dominance. We are undeniably connected by history and ethnicity with a long history of war and hostility. However, this is not the only means of defining ourselves. We can choose now to contribute to the making of a new Europe. Because when we push the human story back enough, we come to a place
25 of common connection to this earth where people of all races meet in brotherhood. It is in this recognition of both our uniqueness as Europeans and our universality as human beings that we can begin to make an authentic contribution to the healing of our nation.

30 Students need to see that they, too, can be full participants in the building of a multicultural world. One way to turn this possibility into reality is through our understanding of cultural rhythms because **contemporary** music is propelled by a rich mixture of such rhythms. It is time for all of us to learn to move with grace and style to the new sounds. The future calls each of us to become partners in the dance of diversity, a dance in which everyone shares the lead. Because we have been
35 separated by race and ethnicity for so long, we all may feel **awkward** at first with the new moves. It will take time to learn to embrace fully our emerging multicultural partnerships. But with a little help from our friends in other cultures we can learn to dance again, as we once did among the great stone circles of ancient Europe. Rather than being isolated in the dancing hall passively watching one another, our
40 people can seize the exciting opportunity to join with peoples of all cultures in creating a nation that actually tries to move to the tune of its own ideals. These are my people, and this could be our vision.
